FROM THE PRESIDENT

I've got a children's story for you. Sometime in June, weather permitting, we expect to reopen Robert Lake Park to the young at heart, closing a year-long tale that began with flood waters from Tropical Storm Diego in May 2018.

The story includes chapters that are inspiring, others confounding, and still others that are just exasperating. We have "all the king's horses" in the roles of government representatives and engineers. There are scary parts, like a year of record rain that washes away some good progress, and cost estimates, and multiple delays. (Here's a terrifying phrase: "You can't start yet. It's trout spawning season." Yikes.) Meanwhile, patient-but-denied park lovers remind us of the urgency we already feel in our bones.

There are heroes. John Quinzi, director of facilities, doggedly drives everyone to deliver the best possible outcome at the best possible price in the best possible time frame. Contractor Dan Hensley consistently exceeds expectations even though we keep raising them. Volunteers contribute time and sweat and energy, and donors contribute just over \$130,000. Turns out, we need just about all of it.

A stroke before midnight, approvals are granted and work begins. Bridges are raised and mounted on deeply poured, concrete footings. Walkways are rebuilt. A new retaining wall guards Assembly Drive from Flat Creek, and vice versa. New grading intends to reduce future flooding.

In the end, the park is restored, stronger than ever, and we are left with a moral to our story as old as time. It takes a community to make a Robert Lake Park – and Montreat – the reality that it is. Thank you so much. May we all live happily ever after.

WILDERNESS HIKING PROGRAM

The Ranger staff will offer two public hikes each Tuesday and Thursday during the conference season. There will be three Saturday full-day trips. Hikes will leave at 9:00am (unless otherwise noted) from the Nature Center located just below the Lake Susan dam. Half-day hikes are designed to return in time for Clubs pick-up at noon; full-day hikes will return mid to late afternoon. Wear sturdy, well-broken-in hiking shoes and bring water, snacks, and for longer hikes, a lunch. All hikes are free and open to the public. You must be 13 or older to attend a hike without an adult guardian. In the event of inclement weather, hikes may be altered, truncated, or cancelled. Please feel free to call the Nature Center at 828.669.9540 to check on trail conditions or hike cancellations.

Before you hike on your own, please come by the Nature Center or the Montreat Store for trail maps and advice. Remember to always file a "flight plan" with someone who is not hiking with you and follow it. Always bring food and water and wear appropriate clothing.

PACE GUIDELINES FOR HIKES:

Leisurely: There is no time crunch for this hike.

Moderate: This hike can afford a few non-scheduled stops.

Fast: This hike must leave on time; hikers may need to walk briskly to get back on time.

Half Day: Rattlesnake Rock (Big Piney Trail)-Pace: moderate with short strenuous sections. Bring plenty of water.

Full Day: Walker's Knob-Pace: moderate; 10.3 miles total; 2,500 ft. gain.

We'll ascend via the Graybeard Trail to Walker's Knob which offers a superlative view of Montreat and Black Mountain. After lunch we'll return via the same route.

THURSDAY JUNE 13, 2019

Half Day: Rainbow Road-Pace: moderate, easy hike

Full Day: Rocky Knob-Pace: moderate; 13.1 miles total; 2,900 ft. gain

We'll ascend the Graybeard Trail and then pop over to the Mitchell Toll Road just above Dickey's Loop. We'll walk the Toll Road north to Rocky Knob, eat lunch at the knob, then take a long rest and enjoy the excellent views of the North Fork watershed before returning to Montreat.

Full Day: East Ridge Ramble—Pace: moderate with a few strenuous sections; 6 miles total; 1,700 ft. gain. From the Nature Center we'll ascend the Lookout Trail and then travel along the East Ridge all the way to Long Gap. In the process, we'll cross Lookout, Boggs' Bunion, Brushy, and Rocky Head. We will take the Trestle to Potts Cove gap, and then return to Montreat via the Graybeard Trail.
