FROM THE PRESIDENT

Do you let your kids walk alone around Montreat? A new book argues that you should, perhaps at ages earlier than you might consider.

The Coddling of the American Mind: How Good Intentions and Bad Ideas Are Setting Up a Generation for Failure presents a disturbing thesis that many college-age adults are unable or unwilling to engage with ideas that make them uncomfortable, and that this trend, if it continues, promises dire consequences for a free society. Of course, if young adults struggle with uncomfortable ideas, it is little wonder, given who has raised them. A harsh finger points directly at parenting today and at more privileged parents in particular, a group described as unnecessarily over-protective.

I smarted at the criticism, but I also noted the authors' approval of some aspects we treasure about parenting during Montreat summers. If, for example, you insist that your children put down their electronics and head for the playground, the narrative affirms that copious time in free play – unstructured by elders – is critical to social and moral development; that "screen time" is a poor substitute; and that, in some circumstances, social media can do more harm than good. Significantly, the authors argue that fostering independence, self-reliance, and resilience in young people should be encouraged and developed with intentional strategies that may strain our protective instincts.

So, at what age should a child venture out alone? I can't answer that. Montreat is safer than most places, statistically speaking, but not so safe that you shouldn't know where your kids are. Further, every summer or two we find a child "on his way to clubs" confidently striding toward the gate. Nor am I a social scientist; I just read this one book. Still, nothing in it dissuades me from the conviction that our recreation programs should continue to emphasize group activity, adventure, and creativity. And we'll keep trying to get your kids off the cell phones...at least until it's time to walk home.

WILDERNESS HIKING PROGRAM

The Ranger staff will offer two public hikes each Tuesday and Thursday during the conference season. There will be three Saturday full-day trips. Hikes will leave at 9:00am (unless otherwise noted) from the Nature Center located just below the Lake Susan dam. Please arrive by 8:50am. Half-day hikes are designed to return in time for Clubs pick-up at noon; full-day hikes will return mid to late afternoon. Wear sturdy, well-broken-in hiking shoes and bring water, snacks, and for longer hikes, a lunch. All hikes are free and open to the public. You must be 13 or older to attend a hike without an adult guardian. In the event of inclement weather, hikes may be altered, truncated, or cancelled. Please feel free to call the Nature Center at 828.669.9540 to check on trail conditions or hike cancellations.

Before you hike on your own, please come by the Nature Center or the Montreat Store for trail maps and advice. Remember to always file a "flight plan" with someone who is not hiking with you and follow it. Always bring food and water and wear appropriate clothing.

PACE GUIDELINES FOR HIKES:

Leisurely: There is no time crunch for this hike.

Moderate: This hike can afford a few non-scheduled stops.

Fast: This hike must leave on time; hikers may need to walk briskly to get back on time.

TUESDAY JUNE 25, 2019

No half-day hike today

Full Day: Mount Mitchell-Pace: moderate, but very long; 18 miles total; 4,000 ft. gain

This is the longest day hike we offer during the season, and one not to be missed if you are up to the challenge! You are responsible for your own transportation back from Mount Mitchell! If you do not have a ride, you may be left behind. This hike requires reservations! Please contact the Nature Center staff as soon as possible to add your name to the list. All hikers will be expected to contribute to the gas fund for our drivers! Please talk to the Ranger staff or one of the Nature Center volunteers for more details about this tough, but very rewarding hike. The uphill route will definitely add Mount Mitchell to your "South Beyond 6,000" list. This hike is especially subject to change based on weather.
